<ul style="list-style-type: none">• How to make salt dough.• Create a 3D Claude Monet water lily from Salt dough.• Paint and glaze the salt dough lily• Draw the salt dough lily in isometric view.• The art movement of 'Pop Art'• Identify some key characteristics from the Pop Art movement.• Produce a piece of Art in the Pop Art style of the artist Andy Warhol.• Learn about the Pop Artist Patrick Caulfield and apply his unique art style to own work.• (Part 1) How to apply a pop art filter to a selfie portrait photograph in preparation for the following art lesson.• (Part 2) How to draw a portrait in proportion as a pencil sketch.• Draw a Pop Art self portrait using the image created in the last lesson and the skill learnt on how to draw a portrait in proportion.• Create Pop Art digital poster on Canva.com	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• <u>Mix up a batch of salt dough</u>• Students will mix the ingredients for the salt dough.• <u>Make a salt dough water lily candle holder</u>• Once the salt dough is ready. Students will cut out 3 stencils out of card for the lily petals. A small medium and large.• Students will roll out the salt dough and cut out a circle for the lily pad. Using the remaining salt dough students will cut out 4 large lily petals, 4 medium lily petals, 6 small lily petals.• After placing the lily petals students will use a tea light to make the right size impression to hold a candle.• The salt dough lily pads will need 3 days to dry before painting.• <u>Paint the salt dough water lily</u>• Using acrylic paint students paint the salt dough white.• Once the paint dries they can start painting the lily, starting at the center and working out they paint the lily petals pink.• The edges of the petals will be accented with the same dark green used to paint the lily pad. Once the paint is dry student will add a glaze to add shine to the finished piece of art and set it aside to dry.• <u>Isometric drawing and evaluation of salt dough water lily</u>• Students will be given a worksheet that explains how to draw the water lily in isometric view and in plan view. 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- Next students will be encouraged to create their own Pop art inspired pictures as demonstrated in the Art video.
- Create a picture mimicking the style used by the Pop Artist Patrick Caulfield
- Students will paint a window using bold colour and dark outlines using geometric shapes and straight lines as we see in Patrick Caulfield's paintings.
- Then they will attempt to recreate a realistic sky in the background.
- Create a Pop Art self portrait using a Pop Art app.
- Using ipads provided by the school students will open the Pop Art app and take a selfie. After they are happy with the image they will select a Pop Art filter to apply to the image.
- Students will send the image to the Art teacher to print out for the second part of this lesson the following week.
- Students will use the second half of the lesson to practice drawing a portrait in proportion.
- Draw a 'Pop Art' self portrait
- Student will take the printout of the Pop Art image they created of themselves the previous week from the teacher.
- In their art book they will attempt to draw and paint the pop Art self-portrait using the skills learnt the previous week on how to draw a portrait in proportion.
- Use canva.com to create a digital 'Pop Art' poster
- Students will create a digital 'Pop Art' Poster on canva.com. It will have to include their 'Pop Art' selfie from the previous week and at least one example of Andy Warhol's pieces of art.
